PROGRAM:

Dick Pope introduced **Michael Joseph**, Senior Project Engineer at Corning, and a 25 year member of the **Tuskegee Airmen**. **Michael** wanted to be an engineer from a very young age, and received his B. Mech. Eng. from the Pratt Institute in 1988, with an AAS in Aeronautical Engineering. **Michael** noted that his invitation to speak to us coincided with the release of the movie "**Red Tails**" in local theaters. The movie has been in the works for many years.

Michael recalled speaking in 1989/90 about making a movie to **Spike Lee**, who was the son of a neighbor in Brooklyn where **Michael** was growing up, and he learned that **George Lucas** had been planning the same movie since 1980, but it could not go ahead until "**Star Wars**" was finished.

Back in the 80's the **Tuskegee Airmen** were not well known at all, and for many of the flyers, the end of WWII was a bitter experience, because they were not given the respect and credit that other returning servicemen and women received.



Michael spoke about several Tuskegee Airmen he had known personally, including **George Freitas** and **Ray Williams**, who is still living at age 90, and **General Benjamin O. Davis**, who issued a Special Letter of Commendation to **Michael**, for his services to the Tuskegee Airmen.

Gen. Davis was commander of the 99th and the 332nd Fighter Group, which

escorted bombers on air combat missions over Europe. **The General** was the first African - American man to graduate from West Point, and his time there was especially difficult. His father was the first African-American Army General.

After the war, **Tuskegee Airmen** participated in the **Apollo program** that put men on the moon, developed the **Sky Marshalls** program at the time that a number of aircraft were being hijacked to Cuba, implemented the 55 mph speed limit, and developed the structural system that permits a skyscraper to pancake when demolished, rather than toppling over -- a design feature that paid dividends when the World Trade center was attacked on 9/11.

Michael concluded his presentation by announcing that **Corning Inc.** is sponsoring a showing of **"Red Tails"** at the **Crystal Cinema** at **3 pm on Feb 16th**, free to employees and their guests. (If you need an invitation, call Michael). Finally, he showed a short video of a Tuskegee Airmen convention, which featured a 500hp turbocharged Buick show car, **"Faithful Pursuit"** designed by himself, and constructed with the aid of other members. Following his talk, **Michael** was given a standing ovation.
